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Welcome back, I hope you had a great holiday. The weather was fantastic, so I hope you managed to get out and about. I know from the children, that many of you jetted off to warmer climes too. I hope everyone, whatever you did, had a great time.

We now begin the summer term at school, which is always a busy one. So let the fun begin....

On Tuesday this week, I led an assembly on being a good role model, based on a speech that Gareth Southgate, Ex-England Football Manager had recently given. Gareth was reflecting on the importance of belief and resilience, especially for young people. He is worried about the amount of time children spend online, particularly due to the challenges of seeing supposedly 'perfect worlds that don't really exist' and looking up to online influencers who may not be the best role models; life is hard at times and children need good role models to help with building their resilience to get through hard times and be able to bounce back. He also talked about children having the ability and determination to take on challenges and not be afraid to make mistakes but use them as learning opportunities.



The children shared their ideas on what a good role model was – many felt parents, grandparents and teachers were the best role models, although one child did mention Lando Norris (British Racing Driver) as one of their role models as he strives to be the best and keeps challenging himself.


I also asked the children if they should believe everything they see online and was really pleased when the children responded that they knew a lot of what they may view could be fake.

At the end of the assembly, I asked the children to reflect on what sort of role model they were and how they could become a better role model in the future.

BEHAVIOUR OUTSIDE OF SCHOOL

Now that the days are lighter and it is starting to warm up, we are hearing reports of children playing outside after school in local parks. We obviously advocate playing outside, and away from screens, however, we'd like to give a gentle reminder about children's behaviour in local parks and public spaces outside of school hours.

While we're not directly involved in what happens outside of school time, often incidents can spill over into school. We've recently had reports about the way some children are interacting at the park – sometimes with children who are not at Rossett Acre, or older/younger children.

It is great for children to have the independence and responsibility of being able to go to the park unsupervised, however, we would really appreciate it if you could have a chat with your child about the following:

- Being kind and respectful to others.
- Including others in play and avoiding any teasing.
- Taking care of the park and equipment.
- Resolving disagreements calmly and seeking help from a trusted adult if needed.

Please also remind children of our Golden Rule – treating others the way you want to be treated.

ECO – TIP


Reduce food waste – try to batch cook and write a shopping list, checking your food cupboards to see exactly what you need before you go. It will save you money too!
