Preparing Your Child for School



A very warm welcome to Early Years at Rossett Acre Primary School! We are often asked how parents can best prepare their children for school, so here are some suggestions.

Many of the children in our Early Years classes have been to a pre-school setting, so they are familiar with taking part in activities with a group of children and other adults. They will be becoming familiar with routines so hopefully their transition to school will be straightforward. However, we feel it is important to familiarise your child with the idea of moving on and meeting new children and adults. This should be communicated to your child as an exciting experience with many new and interesting activities. Many of the activities at school will be similar to home, nursery and playgroup, but there will be new and different ones too!

To help your child transition to school we will:

- Invite your child to school for Taster Visits
 during June and July. During these visits you
 will bring your child to school where they will
 come for a short play with Early Years staff
 and other new children. Parents can remain
 in the school hall, where tea and coffee will
 be provided. This allows your child a taste of
 coming to school independently!
- Invite you and your child to a Stay and Play session in September. You will both be able to explore your new classroom, find out where your peg and drawer are, and have some time to play before your first full day at school. Parents are invited to remain with their child for these sessions if they wish, and you can attend both morning and afternoon sessions if you like.
- Invite you to our Early Years Information
 Evening in the Autumn term to help you find
 out how your child will be playing and
 learning at school.
- Communicate with you whenever necessary. Communication between home and school is fundamental to your child's well-being. Children feel positive about school knowing there is contact between parents and staff. We are very happy to talk to you about any aspect of your child's learning. Please ask to talk to us if you need to first thing in the morning is the best time for any last minute information. You can also use Tapestry to communicate with us.

Preparing Your Child for School

In readiness for school, please try to encourage your child to:

- Dress and undress independently, especially coats and shoes
- Tidy away toys and books after use
- Take turns when sharing games/activities
- Listen at appropriate times and follow simple instructions
- Know when it is time to go to the toilet, and use the toilets independently: to be able to wipe, use the flush and wash their hands
- Feed him/herself and use a knife, fork and spoon



Settling in

Your child will be part of a class of up to 30 children. School starting dates will be staggered and take place over the first week of school. To begin with, children will be in sorted in classes by surname. We will spend the first half-term getting to know the children and then set classes by the end of term (late October). Children will attend school on a full-time basis straight away. If your child struggles with this, please let us know and we can adjust their transition to suit his/her needs. Please tell your child's teacher if you wish to reduce their sessions to part time for a short time. This system has worked well for some children in the past.

Getting to know your child

Prior to school starting, Early Years staff will communicate with pre-school staff, and where possible will visit your child in their pre-school setting.

The Early Years staff will undertake baseline observations/assessments during the Autumn Term. These are statutory and form part of our whole school assessments. They will help us to plan the activities that are needed to help your child progress. The Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) Profile continues to help us to assess the child's achievements in detail throughout the year.

You will be invited into school to discuss your child's progress with us at a formal Parents' Evening (twice per year).

You will be able to access your child's learning journey via Tapestry. There will also be a written report at the end of the year and an opportunity to discuss its contents with the teacher(s) if you wish.

Most importantly, we would like you and your child to feel **happy** at Rossett Acre. We want children to feel confident in themselves and respected for who they are. We also hope they will learn to value and respect the needs of others and will acknowledge and celebrate diversity. We expect high standards of behaviour from all our children, we work with the children to establish a safe learning community where were are Ready, Respectful and Safe.

Our Day in Early Years

Our Day

You can drop your child off between **8:40am and 8:50am.** All children say goodbye to their parents at the gate and then enter through Miss Christie's classroom and get busy at a group activity. Our first carpet time is a phonics lesson, followed by guided reading sessions. We have a healthy snack in the morning session. We have another carpet time before lunch, which is normally literacy or theme based.

After lunch we have a daily maths lesson on the carpet. The rest of our day is spent playing, either in the classroom or outside. The children get to choose where they would like to play and what activities they would like to do. As the year progresses we begin to do focus activities with an adult, either in small groups or individually.

We have a second maths carpet time at the end of the day, and then near hometime we have a big tidy up, have our milk and have a story before we go home. We line the children up in separate classes and bring them to the gates at **3:20pm**.

Learning in the Early Years

As a team we embrace the philosophy that children learn through play. Through active involvement children learn life skills; extend their imagination, creative skills, physical development and communication and thinking skills. We encourage children to use a range of resources to support their activities and actively encourage children to play alongside or with others to build on their collaborative skills. Equally we encourage children to become independent, managing their own belongings, finding their own activities and making decisions.

Through careful observation we discover what and how children are learning, how they communicate and how we can best provide for the next stage of their learning. We support them in their play by listening to them, watching them, providing and encouraging questions and extending their thinking.

Food

Children can have a school meal, or bring a packed lunch to school. All children in Early Years and Key Stage 1 currently receive a free school meal, however if you think you may qualify for Pupil Premium, we would be grateful if you would complete the form on the school website. Click here for link. If you do decide to choose packed lunches for your child, we encourage healthy choices, and please **no nuts**, we have children and adults in school with significant allergies.

Children will be provided with a healthy snack, which we have mid-morning. They will also receive milk to drink in the afternoon. Milk is provided up to the age of five, you can register with Cool Milk if you wish your child to continue to receive milk in school after their fifth birthday. Children should bring a water bottle to school every day - we do not allow juice in school.

Monday 2nd September:


12pm - 1:45pm

What to Bring to School

- Bookbag we prefer these to backpacks as they fit in the children's trays in the classroom. There isn't much room in the cloakroom!
- Water bottle
- PE kits not needed until spring term we will remind you in advance
- Change of clothes/underwear (if you think your child might need them)
- Wellies (to be left in school)
- Coat (even on a dry day!)
- Weather dependent sun hat, gloves, scarf etc.

Please make sure **everything** is labelled with your child's name – if it can come off your child, it can get lost!
